I have given this situation considerable thought since receiving your memo of October 20th. I agree that the area is geologically favourable, but there does not appear to be any simple or direct approach to locating actual mineralization. I think that if we were to option the property, we would have to do either a combination of electrical and geochemical work or rely on the more simple expedient of prospecting and bulldozer stripping.

Any form of electrical work would obviously be plagued by graphitic schist and possibly by conductive fault zones barren of mineralization. Some of the graphitic anomalies could be eliminated because their directional trend would be different from that of the vein faults. In areas of folding, however, the problem would become more involved.

Geochemistry would, perhaps, be feasible if we could get a power auger which would give us a soil sample within 1' of bed rock. The soil could be analyzed for total heavy metal content rather than for lead because of the broader dispersion of the former. If the average depth of cover does not exceed 10' we could probably find the right type of auger for this work. Hand augers would not suffice because of perma-frost.

If, then, we found electrical anomalies of comparatively low intensity and with a North East orientation parallel to productive veins on which were superimposed geochemical anomalies, we would have a target. Before getting too deeply into this type of thing, however, I should advise that Aho and Poli are asking a down payment of \$5,000.00 for the UR Property. We would then have a year, after which the vendors would expect some undesignated combination of stock and payments. This is, of course, a preliminary asking price and it is open to negotiation.

It seems to me that we would have to do a certain amount of preliminary research in that area with various forms of equipment to know whether or not the type of approach I had in mind would be workable.
