PROPOSED NAHANNI JOINT VENTURE 1973

Please find enclosed copies of the letters sent to N. W. Reynolds of Great Plains and T. Davies of Woods Petroleum of Canada. I also enclose an outline of the proposed project which describes location, purpose, procedures and costs.

I didn't think we should consider the geographic outline as being immutable in view of the heavy staking which is in progress. In any case we have tried to select the area in such a manner that it will encompass all of the useful rock types, but will avoid those areas which have perhaps been silted in detail by Amax, Hudson Bay and others.

I would strongly urge that you consider the merits of a two month programme financed by ourselves which would concentrate on stream silt coverage moreso than we have in our past projects. In other words I think that we could cover perhaps twice the area that we have covered in past primary projects, even where the time involved is reduced from three to two months, I mention this as a hedge against the possibility that potential partners may drag their feet too long and if we are to arrange for helicopter support for a two month period, then it may be a matter of some urgency to make these arrangements by the end of February. My feeling is that we can finance our own programme by taking \$15,000 from the Yukon general fund and this should be adequate for a two month programme.

This tactic of concentrating on stream silting in preference to geology and prospecting is very common with exploration companies here and I think we need have no great hesitation about utilizing the procedure ourselves.
