Dear Sir:

I located a mineral prospect late in the fall of 1964 which is freakish both in its country-rock situation and also internally, in its mineral associations. Mineral deposits are generally termed 'freaks' of nature and, even at this early stage of work, I believe this latest freak may have a better than average chance of proving economically interesting.

The prospect is favorably situated for easy examination access; should it prove to have an economic capacity, with further exploration, road construction cost would be a minor charge against the property. The site is not far from the existing highway, about 20 miles out of Whitehorse.

I'll be prospecting the immediate area again this coming spring to more clearly define the zone, prior to staking. A strong quartz vein, intermittently exposed in recent time, shows up in sections along a strike length of 2,500 feet. The end of another vein, about a half mile away, has a directional trend which might connect it with the main vein centrally, at an angle of 45 degrees. Other veins may also exist to form a vein system within the zone, but if so, these are still below the present rock surface.

The quartz is mineralized with gold, silver, galena, and magnetite. The gold is free-milling; the silver occurs with minor galena; the galena has been subjected to the conditions of movement and pressure exemplified by this mineral in the quartz veins at Mt. Nansen. It occurs flattened and smoothed out, in small pieces. These three minerals are closely associated, and the gangue magnetite occurs with them as very fine grains, possibly to 0.1% of the total vein matter.

I doubt that I would have taken the one 'picked' sample for assay at all, had not the freakish aspect of the occurrence intrigued me. This sample showed only quartz and minor galena, under 20X magnification. It assayed 3.74 ozs Au and 2.60 ozs Ag, for a ratio of about 1.5 gold to 1 of silver.

Apart from our mutual goodwill, your connection with Peso Silver Mines and the aggressive exploration program of that Company in the Yukon constitutes a good reason for bringing this prospect to your attention. I have more information, but am retaining it prior to staking and further work on the ground. In any case, Aaro, the geology and its structural aspects will be revealed to your trained judgement on examination.
