Dear Sir.

We are getting plenty of snow here and to-day about 6 inches more, that's the most snow I've seen yet. The run-off will be gentle, otherwise there be floods and washout. The best information about the White Creek Claims is that the staking is at the head of White Creek, and are waiting for the Plain Claims the run out, and stake them and connect up ~~with~~ with the Claims at Head of White Creek. It is Dominion Expl or a subsidiary there of. They will perhaps stake as they prospect this season and have it surrounded by the ~~at~~ same Plain Claims run out. There has been some staking lately at Fish Lake, possible Giltana Lake Copper and it looks like Ketna River to North Lake will all be staked on the snow. There is little a fellow can do in all this snow, so I'm doing a lot of reading and studying rocks and minerals and maps. I hope you will be able to do something about the Claims, I know it takes

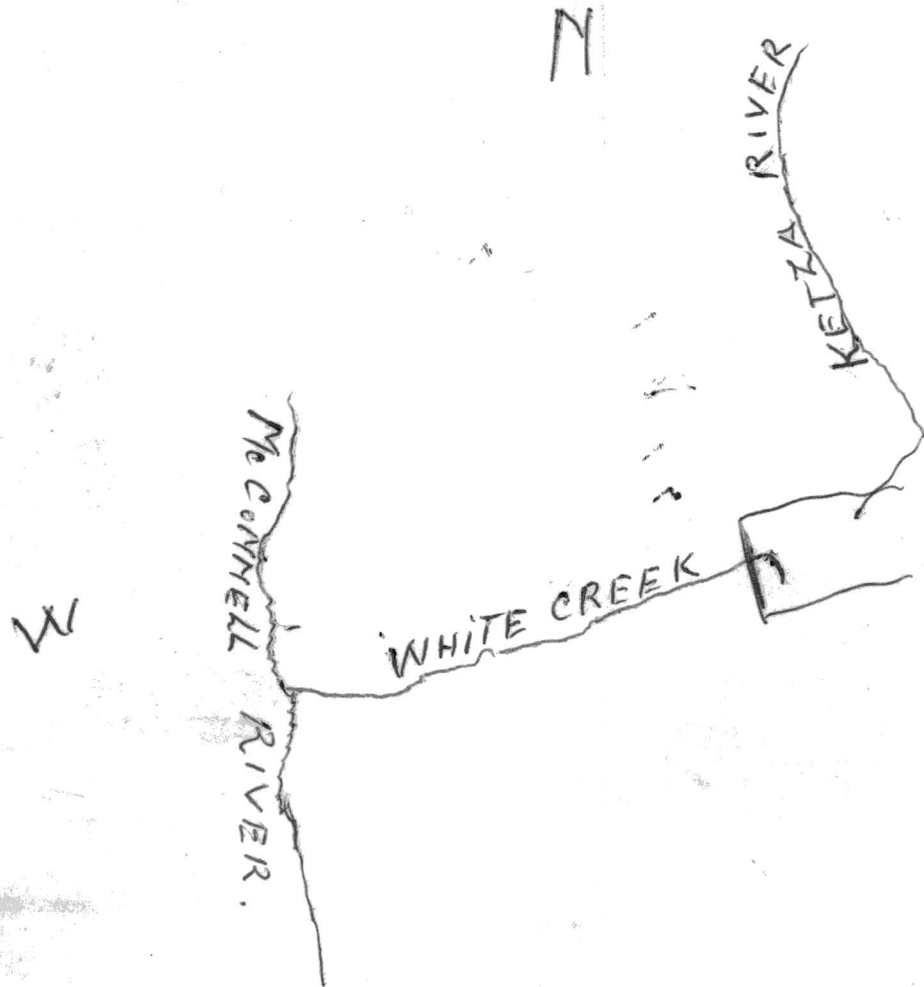
a cat to find out if there is anything there
but since there is a Company in the area, they
may offer a good price for it. Seagull Lake
The Claims should be a good bet to. And
may stop around there myself this spring, but
is open. I'm making maps of area's prospectors
around Seagull and White Creek. In case a
Company is interesting in staking ground, if they
offer me a good deal, under no circumstance
will I give information unless I'm well
paid for it. This Prospectors Assistance
Program for the Yukon, does not go over very well
only 7 or 8 have ~~of~~ made application.

I have not made application yet, and may
not apply at all, since I want to be free
to go, and not tell them where I'll be
prospecting. I was expecting you to be back
in Whitehorse again before this, so I was
told at the meeting Chambers of Mines
that you would be back soon. Anyway if
you did not get the staking sheet of
White Creek, I made a rough sketch here.

On our way to Grayling Lake, horses maybe on there way in one or two days. We will investigate that sidecut below the Forks at White Creek, which appears to be on a fault zone near Grizzly Creek, I know there is some galena with it, and maybe something like the Drop Creek.

I send in the expense account of paid bills, and there is not much to go on, untill there is more put in. In case we have to hire men for staking, our grub should last for one month or more. We will spend most of this month and perhaps, some of next month around the White Creek, Grizzly and north of White Creek. The 10.10 etc as proposed. We are about to land at Grayling Lake, so I hope to have better luck.

Dear Sir,

This season is going to be very late. The weather stays cool, we had two days warm weather, and it is raining again today. I have not received the agreement yet. And some arrangements have to be made as to look after the financial part. Assays to be sent to. At present there is no place like home. There is no use kidding yourself that you can do something out in the bush in that area yet. I will see Promfo and he may have some idea at what time it is possible to land on a open lake in the general area. Ingie or Bruce will do. If that takes too long, we have to go by Canal road if that is not washed out by that time. So you can see it is a problem. The only sure way is by helicopter, and make a airdrop. It is possible that the White Creek claims are already staked, and so at Seagull. I have information that Dominion Expl is trying to make a deal for those claims of B.Y.R. that are in good standing the Pain Claims that is. In that case, if they are staked before we get there. I have to look into 101 & 102

and do a little digging around there could be something there, since it is on a ~~flat~~ fault, and is showing in a close area. The Sylvia Mountains should be investigated further. And several places in the White Creek. Seagull Creek area. There may be parties there besides us, and in that case, it may be necessary to stake first and prospect after. Then we also have to be careful that we are 10 mile away for other claims we staked. That's where the packer comes in handy. I hope to take pictures of showings that we find and I know of. It is my intention to do most of the prospecting along the faults at Seagull and White Creek, and if you want us to go to McNeil Lake area we can spend some time there too. We be plenty busy once in the field. At McNeil we had little time to see much there, since we got snowed out at August 25, but what we did see looks interesting. So hoping this weather improve and be able to get started. I have copies of your "Index Mineral Map" so that we can use them in the field and report the "numbers" in samples.

I have done some staking in the Whitehorse Copper Belt, lately and there is plenty of snow yet. Dominion Exploration Company has bought the Dugdale Mineral Claims for cash and is also taken over the Whitehorse Copper Belt. So me and Pete have been staked some open ground in the Copper belt and may have a good chance to sell them. It may take another month before a person can go into the tundra area, most of the lakes around here ~~are~~ are still frozen and the Yukon River ice at Dawson has not gone out yet. Jimmy Coe is willing to go out at \$425 per month and I will ~~to~~ give him 5% interest, Horses are available at Champagne, but will see Carly instead since he hunts in that area. I have nothing excepted yet, but just inquired so far. Thank for the Cash Advance. I intend to get 3 horses and Packer. Best regard

I shall be busy soon working on the houses, but shall be ready to go out, soon weather permitting and lakes are free of ice, or go by road if suitable. So hope to hear from you, and line thing up for the season.

Dear Harry:

After about three solid weeks of paper work I am finally getting everything cleaned up, and will get the balance of your cheques to you sometime next week.

For you and Jim I deducted both income tax and unemployment insurance but since you managed the syndicate in the field, I will credit you with \$24.48 cash instead of sending you stamps. Since Jim would have to be eligible and may also be able to collect, I am also sending his stamps along in this letter so when you see him next time give him the stamps to put in his book.

I will also be sending an additional \$1000 bonus for each of you, and will send you a complete statement of accounts.

My report on the Syndicate is not yet complete but when it is, I will also send along a copy.

We have not yet decided what to do but I expect that a company will be formed and certainly next season we should have about \$100,000 to spend on (a) the properties and (b) more prospecting. This time there should be at least 2 good geologists in the field - one on the properties and one to map the Tetra for his Ph.D. thesis. Maybe we'll make the total \$100,000.

to allow plenty of work to be done.

It annoys me that Ray rushed in and out so fast and dragged you to Mayo without at least putting in 8 more claims but as we said - it is probably well enough covered anyway except for more prospecting ground which could have been staked. I have not had a chance to do anything yet about Pete & John McIsaac's holdings but you could tell Pete that we are discussing it and will let him know.

Meanwhile, things should come along very well for next season, and we should be able to make it a little more convenient and comfortable. Lets hope the weather is better. I want to get in there to see the showing first thing next year and also to have another look at White creek for a bulldozer programme.

Thanks again for all the accounts and also for the excellent diary which I read out to the syndicate so that they can appreciate what a prospector goes through and also how well mineralized the area is.

We now have all the B.Y.E. claims transferred into the syndicate.
